What advice would you give to young women aspiring to pursue a career in finance?

Finance is a very rewarding yet challenging field, which requires among other things, a proactive approach, intellectual curiosity, hard work, determination, and a commitment to continuous learning. There are several points of advice that I would offer to young women pursuing a career in finance, starting with acquiring a strong foundation in technical skills such as accounting, financial analysis, and/or financial modeling through their academic careers, through in-person or online courses, school sponsored industry related clubs, and through selective internships. Which leads to my second point of advice, which is to pursue a variety of finance related internships to not only build technical skills, but to help build knowledge and further define the areas of finance you are interested in, or conversely less interested in. Another piece of advice I would offer would be to dedicate time to networking, building a strong professional network, and looking to find someone you connect with to act as a mentor. Someone you respect and look up to and connect with organically. And someone you can share a twoway dialogue with in seeking advice and being prepared with questions. Join on-campus clubs related to the finance industry, which offers opportunities to learn, apply knowledge through practical exercises and projects, attend speaker series, and network with industry professionals. With anything, the path to success can vary depending on timing, dedication, opportunities, and personal goal, but these suggestions for advice should greatly support you through the process.

What inspired you to pursue a career in Structured Finance?

Coming from a position in our company's finance and accounting department, I was drawn to the structured finance industry by its growth, innovation and complexity. Seeing the rise in issuance, the variety of asset classes, and the number of factors and motivations for issuance, made structured finance very appealing and something I wanted to be a part of. As I began to learn more about structured finance, I got a better understanding of the role it played in the overall financial markets and how it helped to fund portions of the global economy.
